3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The college is responsive to community needs and intrinsically intertwined with the national fabric. Concentrated efforts are made to provide expanded opportunities to the students to participate in community development programmes.

- N.S.S. unit of the college provides Blood Donors Cards to needy persons which enable them to obtain a blood bottle (350 ml.) per card free of cost. Every year about 25-30 cards are used by college teaching/non-teaching staff and outsiders.

- Photocopy of the answer-book is made available to the students for verification on request by aggrieved students.
- Revaluation of answer-books by external examiners is undertaken on request by aggrieved students.
